What is the Annual Parish Meeting?

When is the Annual Parish Meeting?

This year the Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7pm on Monday the 22nd of April, at Middleton Cheney Community Library.

What is the purpose of the Annual Parish Meeting?

The purpose of the meeting is to give the Parish Council, and other local organisations an opportunity to let local residents know what they have been doing over the past year. The meeting is also an opportunity for electors to have a say on anything they consider valuable to the people of the Parish.

What else happens at the meeting?

The meeting can also be an opportunity for local groups, clubs, societies and other voluntary and statutory organisations to provide an exhibition and/or have representatives from the group to address those present at the meeting about the work they do and what they are involved in.

Who can attend the meeting?

The Annual Parish Meeting is for all electors in the Parish. It is not a meeting of the Parish Council. Anyone is welcome to attend the meeting. However only registered electors of the parish may speak and vote during the meeting.

Will I be able to ask questions and make suggestions?

Any registered elector may ask a question of the Parish Council which will usually be answered by the Chair, the Clerk of the Council or a designated Councillor. An elector may also make a suggestion and comment on anything pertinent to the residents of the Parish. This will be welcomed and is the whole purpose of the meeting.

Who will chair the meeting?

The Chairperson of the Parish Council will chair the meeting. The Chair will usually convene the meeting but it can also be convened by any two councillors, a Councillor representing the Parish on the Unitary Authority or any six local electors.

Will Parish Councillors be at the meeting?

All Parish Councillors will be invited to attend. However, the purpose of the meeting is to enable the electors to find out what is going on in the parish and to have their say.

Will minutes of the meeting be taken?

Minutes of the proceedings will be recorded. The minutes will be reviewed and signed at the next Annual Parish Meeting. (2023 minutes will be signed at the beginning of 2024 meeting)

How long will the meeting last?

The length of the meeting is dependent on the number of electors present, the number of questions asked ad the discussion that is raised. Generally, the meeting will not last longer than two hours.

Where can I get copies of papers for the meeting?

The agenda calling the meeting will be published 7 days before the meeting. The agenda and supporting paper work will be available to download on our website. https://www.middletoncheney.org.uk/

COMMUNITY LIBRARY

Middleton Cheney Community Library opened 155 times in 2023 and gave a warm welcome to over 6,500 visitors topped off with a very successful craft session for children just before Christmas.

Your library is now re-organised and repainted to maximise space and allow room for the burgeoning local studies section. Children's activities are going from strength to strength and we did restart evening activities...paused awaiting a volunteer to coordinate them. Regular out-of-hours lettings are increasing. The book swap and jigsaw swap are both flourishing and in apple pie order (most of the time).

You do not need to bring a book or jigsaw in order to take one as we always have more donations than we need!! We now know when all of the county stock was last taken out so we can cull old stock more efficiently to make room for new books, which we can now choose for ourselves, suggestions welcome.

Councillor Ruth Hoose interviews Kay Andrews-Kuhn of the Lynden Players

How long have the Lynden Players been based in Middleton Cheney and on average how many shows and performances do you do each year?

The Lynden Players began in 1975, created by a group of WI members. Gradually the group expanded to include men, and the society has entertained the village and surrounding areas ever since. Our usual format is a spring show in May, often a musical, with a pantomime or Christmas show in December.

Previous spring shows have included classic musicals such as South Pacific and Singin' in the Rain. Some of our best successes have been more modern musicals such as Little Shop of Horrors, Return to the Forbidden Planet and 9-5 The Dolly Parton Musical. Lynden Players have also taken on the challenge of Shakespeare with A Mid Summer Night's Dream and most recently The Complete Works of Shakespeare (Abridged).

We love a panto (doesn't everyone?) and have performed many traditional titles: Cinderella, Dick Whittington etc., plus some new and original stories.

Some years have also seen a 'supper show', who can forget Fawlty Towers, Bouncers or The Trench. We have also competed at the prestigious Lighthorne Festival against other drama groups.

One of our aims is to support new and local writers. Our latest production is Audition Day, a comedy written and directed by Ken Lusted. It will be a supper show and takes place 16-18 May 2024. Don't miss it; it's a very funny show which lifts the lid on Amateur Dramatics, something that Ken obviously knows very well! Menu and ticket prices to be announced shortly, keep an eye on our website or facebook page.

LYNDEN PLAYERS

How long have you been writing plays and pantomimes? Do you usually perform in them as well?

I have been very lucky to be able to write and direct shows for Lynden Players. I wrote my first show in 2015–Hood the panto–which was an epic production with a huge cast including a long list of fairy tale characters and a time travelling cyborg. I said never again, but two years later came back with CAMP, a

rom-com-who-dunnit set in the 1970s, with a killer soundtrack and platform shoes The memory of the entire village hall singing Tiger Feet will always be one of my proudest moments.

I said never again (again) and instead wrote a one act play for Lighthorne Festival in 2019. I still hold the title of 'rudest play ever to appear at the festival' for PLOT (it was also one of the funniest!). This was followed up by a second act: The Plot Thickens in 2022, which we took on tour. The best things come in threes, they say, so I wrote my third and final panto, AHOY which was performed in December. Set on board a luxury liner in the 1930s, AHOY was a heady mix of glamour, great songs and bad jokes, and an unexpected plot twist!

I don't perform in my own shows, but I do love to be on stage, especially in a pantomime. There's nothing like the buzz of being in front of an audience and I'm looking forward to treading the boards again soon.

Have you a favourite production?

I have loved all the pantomimes that I've been involved with since 2005 when I joined the group. My first role was Porthos in the Three Musketeers. I have played a male character quite a few times, principal boy in tights and boots when I was younger, now I seem to get the 'older' male roles with a bushy moustache or beard. That's showbiz, folks!

I have a couple of favourites where I managed to bag the dream role. I played Lady Bracknell in The Importance of Being Earnest, complete with outrageous hats and the famous handbag line. It was such an honour to be part of a great cast in one of our best shows. I was also lucky enough to be cast as Bottom the Weaver in A Mid Summer Night's Dream. Shakespeare was a new experience for most of us and a real challenge to learn the lines but it was such a fantastic thing to be part of. I still have the donkey's head and a bunch of happy memories.

What aspect of being part of the Lynden Players do you find most rewarding?

Quite simply, Lynden Players is a family affair-our last show featured several mothers, fathers and their children in the cast and crew, we have had grandparents, brothers, sisters, you name it. I have made my best friends there and a big part of the enjoyment is doing something we love, together. There are a few drama queens (or is it just me) but like any family, we pull together and support each other. It's great fun and we laugh a LOT.

How many people are involved in each production, including cast and backstage crew?

All shows are different, but the Christmas panto is usually the biggest production in terms of numbers. For the last show there was a cast of 21 plus 12 juniors and 4 band members.

Add to this a large production team, director, producer, musical director, choreographer, lighting, sound, stage manager and backstage crew, wardrobe, hair and make up, props, box office and front of house team, set design and build, box office and marketing, bar, prompt, chaperones. Some of these jobs were covered by cast members but you can expect at least 20 more people to be involved, often family and friends, and other LP members. The more the merrier! We have some excellent young adults in our team

who are learning practical skills but also workplace skills: team work, time management, creativity and resourcefulness.

Our supper shows are very popular, and these create extra jobs in the kitchen and for serving, setting up tables in advance and washing up afterwards. It is hard work, but we make it fun and it's really rewarding- honestly!

How can people contact you if they wish to become involved with the Lynden Players and what is the time commitment over the year?

The best way to contact us is by email lyndenplayers@gmail.com You can also leave a message on our website www.lyndenplayers.com or Facebook pages. We have open auditions and readings two or three times a year, you are also welcome to come to rehearsals and see what goes on-we are in the village hall from 8pm on a Wednesday night, let us know in advance and someone will meet you and have a chat.

The time commitment is really up to you. If you want to be on stage, there are weekly rehearsals and show week is very busy. There are lots of other ways to get involved that are just as important: we always need members who like to paint scenery, sew, design posters, organise, deliver flyers or make tea. For every show there's also hair, make up, first aid, chaperones, prompts, back stage, set building, sound, lighting, music, social media content, website and PR. If you want to learn some new skills, we have experienced members who would love to show you the ropes. If you can spare one or two weekends or a few evenings we would love to meet you.

We are a friendly bunch and organise social events throughout the year: quiz nights, theatre trips- maybe you could be our new event planner? Don't worry if it's not for youwe have lots of vacancies for audience members. See you at the next show...?

Last performed by The Brackley Jubilee Choir in 2015, Faure's Requiem & The Cantique de Jean Racine are amongst the most widely performed choral works, with Fauré's Requiem generally considered the composer's greatest achievement.
