

The Chairman's Annual Report 2022-23 (summary)

It has once again been a difficult year for so many, what with the effects of global economic challenges, and the aftermath of the COVID pandemic, but despite this it has been wonderful to see the strong sense of community in Middleton Cheney. Middleton Cheney Parish Council is extremely proud of its voluntary groups and organisations which work consistently to support the local community.

As is normal, the Parish Council have experienced highs and lows during the 2022/23 Financial Year. While maintaining the usual high quality of services though, the Parish Council managed to reduce the precept demand by approximately 15% in the last financial year, meaning a lower Parish Council element to resident's council tax; and have again brought down the demand for the forthcoming year. Investment in updating streetlights from the SOX lighting to the latest LED technology last year is already realising significant savings in energy costs.

Following on from membership challenges in the previous year the Council has gone from strength to strength in the last 12 months. There have been few changes in Council membership. We were very sad to lose Councillors Stuart Howard, Peter Gliwitzki, Alison Knight and Kay Stevens

and thank them sincerely for their valued contributions. We are delighted to welcome Councillors Rachel Washer and Nigel Mills. It is fantastic to see their commitment and enthusiasm to their roles. It is without doubt they will be fantastic assets to the Council and community of Middleton Cheney.

It was with deep regret the Parish Council closed the existing Cemetery provision to reservations earlier this year. For many years the Council has been building plans to enable acquisition to facilitate the opening of a new Cemetery provision within the village. Preparation of a Cemetery extension will be a major project for the Council in the coming years.

In addition to the scheduled monthly meetings, a number of Members gave additional time to attend Committees and Working Groups to address specific issues and support future events. This has been a fantastic effort by Members of the Parish Council and volunteers and is to be applauded. I would like to thank you all for your attendance and achievements and support over the last year.

It was very sad to lose her majesty Queen Elizabeth II in September 2022. This invoked operation London Bridge to which Council responded with great agility and precision. Many thanks to all members, for their hard work to make this protocol successful, and particular thanks to Cllr. Burgess for the excellent delivery of the proclamation address.

Caring for the village in a cost of living crisis

In December the Parish Council confirmed their budgets and precept demand. The precept is the Parish Council's charges that form part of our residents' council tax bill. The Parish Council has been working to continuously become more spend-efficient and look long-term at strategies to reduce unnecessary costs.. The Precept from the 2023/24 budget of £133,728 represents a 2.16% reduction on the previous year.

The table below shows the Middleton Cheney Parish Council Precept for the last 5 years. What can be seen here is a modest inflationary level rise in the 2020/21 year, followed by a large 22.1% increase in the subsequent 2021/22 year. From then though, the Precept has been reduced first by 14.4 % in 2022/23, then reduced again this year by the 2.16% for the forthcoming 2023/24 financial year. The overall change over the 5-year period now stands at +3.43%.



Reducing light pollution, reducing our costs, improving our infrastructure

Due to the street lights in Middleton Cheney reaching the end of their lives and replacement parts falling out of manufacture, the Parish Council instructed new energy efficient upgrades to all Parish-owned lights. The National Grid have now corresponded with our electricity supplier for the Parish Council street lights. We now have some data to show the early savings we have already made by upgrading to more energy efficient

The original supply for the past year averaged £5035.15 per guarter, excluding maintenance.

The new supply charges for the last 2 Quarters of 2022 average £2602.20. Maintenance charges are excluded as the lamps are guaranteed for 10 years! Including the upgrade costs averaged over their 10 year guarantee, the total averages charges have began to plummet in comparison to the previous total charge projections.



The Council is working towards hosting a commemoration event over the coronation weekend which was to involve a battle re-enactment from the Sealed Knot. Unfortunately securing a suitable site to host the battle has not been achieved, so we have had to halt this element of the proposal. More details of the revised plan will be coming soon. Many thanks to Members for the great deal of work which has already taken place and is still going into this.

Throughout the hardships over the last few years, we have achieved so much. The time Members give of freely is noteworthy and although the Council carried some vacancies for a spell, we now only hold one vacancy. Members bring together diverse skills to support the Council work and those interested in becoming a Parish Councillor are invited to apply.

Our financial situation is sound, with adequate cash reserves, but with the continued financial pressures on local authorities we remain prudent. As Councillors it is imperative that we operate good financial stewardship principles to ensure we spend money wisely. We continue to look for every opportunity to save on our budgeted expenditure, and this year our External Auditor PKF Littlejohn will again audit to confirm our financial management. The previous year's final audit returns have been delayed due to concerns raised, the auditors have highlighted their issues and weaknesses which will inform the latest AGAR submission accordingly.

The Parish Council have recently engaged a new contractor to maintain the Cemetery, parks, and open spaces in good order. Councillors are also currently working on various regeneration initiatives relating to green areas. The Council's Parks and open spaces continue to be well used, and the Council is proud and committed to retaining its open space provision and to build upon this for the benefit of parishioners now and in the future.

Finally, I must thank the Council's other staff, Debbie, and Richard. Who as a team have ensured that the village has been kept tidy, but moreover for their commitment to ensuring our facilities are kept clean and safe for all users. I am very grateful to them both.

I hope the Parish Council and parishioners continue to look forward to better times and the Council invites all to engage and attend its meetings and events and activities it is proud to host in Middleton Chenev.
